How to report an outage

Call 217-707-6156. When you report an outage, give your name and location number. Before calling, check your fuses or circuit breakers. Check with your neighbors. Call to report hazardous conditions. Please do not report outages on Facebook.

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In a Cooperative like MJM Electric, you are a Member-Owner of the business. One major difference between a Cooperative and an investor-owned utility is that you see an ownership in the business through capital credits. When capital credits are returned to Members, you are seeing the return on your investment. This is one of the benefits of being served by a not-for-profit utility!

Many MJM Members do not realize that we're a notfor-profit utility. Every month you pay your bill, you are helping to finance, not just the purchase and production of power, but improvements to the system that keep the lights on. **You are investing in YOUR Cooperative**. Your immediate payback is in the form of increased reliability and affordable rates.

Capital credits are the money or margins that is left over after all bills associated with doing business have been paid. Each of you are entitled to these capital credits, or a share of the refund based on your energy use. Before returning these capital credits back to you, MJM uses this capital to offset the cost of debt for the construction and maintenance of the electric distribution system. This working capital represents your ownership equity in MJM. Each generation of Cooperative Members contributes, builds equity in the Co-op, and then is rewarded with a capital credit refund. This system is unique to not-for-

profit electric cooperatives. People served by for-profit utilities do not reap these benefits.

Per Cooperative bylaws, MJM's Member-elected Board or Directors determines the amount of margins retired each year based on the Cooperative's financial condition and other considerations. At the August 26th, 2021, board meeting, a motion was made to retire all of 1983 Cooperative's margins in the amount of \$626,570. Since the first capital credit refunds were made, MJM has returned \$5 Million back to its Members and has distributed capital credit refunds the last nine consecutive years.

The 1983 general retirement will show up on Member's bills as a credit on their December 1st, 2021, billing statement. Active Members who have been named as an heir of an estate and Members no longer on MJM lines will receive this capital credit refund via check. If the refund is under \$10, a check will not be reissued but will be donated back to the Cooperative as permanent equity.

Do not forget that even if you have moved away from the Cooperative lines, you are still eligible to receive your capital credits. Always make sure that we have a current address on file. If you have any questions, please call us at 217-707-6156.



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It's a Matter of (Co-op) Principles!...pt 2

For me, this is a time of year for refection, and topping my list of things I'm grateful for is our wonderful community. This means the Co-op is not being influenced by leaders or shareholders several states away. Instead, the Co-op is led by the local Members it serves.

Education and Training

The fifth principle, Education and Training, focuses on enhancing the knowledge of Co-op employees and Board Members, which enables them to contribute to the development of the Co-op.


By investing in continuous learning for our employees and Board Members, our Co-op is making a commitment not just to individual professional and personal growth, but to the future of the Co-op and the high quality of service our members expect and deserve. It's a win-win situation.

Cooperation Among Cooperatives

Cooperation among Cooperatives is the sixth principle and fosters the way that co-ops work together to address bigger challenges. While this principle applies to all types of cooperatives, it is especially relevant in the energy industry. In our case, we put this principle in action after major storms and disasters that cause widespread power outages. When this happens, we call on nearby Co-ops to come to our aid and assist with restoration efforts—and we of course extend the same help to them when they need us. 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Calling All Leaders!

Kay Schultz, District 6 - William Heyen, and District 9 - Marcie Tonsor are up for re-election. These Board of Directors will be voted on at the 2022 Annual Meeting. Due to continued COVID restrictions, a decision as to when or where the Annual Meeting will be has yet to be determined.

34 SCHOLARSHIPS

Illinois electric cooperatives will award 14 scholarships in 2022 to financially assist deserving students in the electric cooperative family. The 14 scholarships, \$2,000 each, will be awarded through the Thomas H. Moore Illinois Electric Cooperatives (IEC) Memorial Scholarship Program.

Eight scholarships will be awarded to high school seniors who are the sons or daughters of an Illinois electric co-op member. A ninth scholarship, the Earl W. Struck Memorial Scholarship, will be awarded to a student who is the son or daughter of an Illinois electric cooperative employee or director. Four additional scholarships are reserved for students enrolling full time at a two-year Illinois community college who are the sons or daughters of Illinois electric cooperative members, employees or directors.

The 14th scholarship, the LaVern and Nola McEntire Memorial Lineworker's Scholarship, will help pay for costs to attend lineworker school conducted by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College, Springfield, Ill. Sons and daughters of co-op members, relatives of co-op employees or directors, and individuals who have served or are serving in the armed forces or National Guard are all eligible for this scholarship.

"We hope to assist electric cooperative youth while honoring past rural electric leaders with these scholarships," says CEO/President Laura Cutler. "MJM Electric and the other Illinois electric cooperatives are always seeking ways to make a difference in our communities. One of the best ways we can do that is by helping our youth and investing in them through programs like this one."

Along with the announcement of 14 scholarship opportunities, MJM's \$1,000 Scholarship Program is now live! MJM will award two \$1,000 scholarships to sons and daughters of MJM Members. The applicant must be a high school senior who is planning to enroll in a full-time (at least 12 hours) undergraduate course of study at an accredited two-year or four-year college, university, community college, or vocational/technical school in the United States. Only one application is needed for both the Thomas H. Moore Illinois Electric Cooperative and MJM's \$1,000 Scholarship Program.

Deadline to apply is Dec. 31, 2021. The lineworker scholarship deadline is April 30, 2022. For more information regarding the scholarships, contact Brooke Gross at 217-707-6028. Information is available online at https://mjmec.coop/scholarships.
